WHAT ARE **OPIOIDS?**

Opioids are a class of drugs that reduce pain and promote feelings of pleasure and relaxation. Taking too many opioids slows your breathing which leads to lack of oxygen in your brain, coma, heart stopping, and death. This process can be fast, so time is critical to saving a life.

Common opioids include prescription opioids, heroin, and illicit fentanyl.

WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF AN **OVERDOSE?**

- Blue lips/fingernails (ashen if darker skin)
- Breathing that is infrequent, uneven or has stopped
- Deep snoring or gurgling noises
- Unresponsive to pain stimulus
- Pinpoint pupils

WHAT IS NALOXONE?

- Naloxone (Narcan[®]) is a drug that temporarily reverses the dangerous effects of an opioid overdose
- Naloxone can be given every 2-3 minutes, but only works if opioids are
- in your body Works for reversing fentanyl overdoses
- A person cannot get high on it or become addicted to it


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

HOW TO PREVENT OVERDOSE AND REDUCE HARM

- Do not mix with other drugs especially alcohol, benzodiazepines, and anything that makes you sleepy
- Store your medication out of reach of children or pets
- Reduce substance amounts
- Be aware of the tolerance changes in your body
- Go slow if injecting drugs
- Alternate injection sites
- Train family/friends to call for help and know where naloxone is stored and how to use it
- Go slow, never use alone, and carry naloxone





- 1. Pop the orange flip top from the naloxone vial
- 2. Insert 23-25G, 1-1.5 inch needle into the vial and draw 1 mL of naloxone into syringe
- 3. Inject needle straight into muscle (through clothes, if needed), then push in plunger all the way

Do rescue breaths: 2 breaths initially, then 1 breath every 5-6 second OR Start CPR if you know how OR follow dispatch instructions

NALOXONE AGAIN


Repeat naloxone in 2-3 minutes if the person does not resume breathing. Recovery position (side lying) if you must leave the person unattended or the person vomits.

Stay with the person if safe to do so until help arrives.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR narcan nasalspray

Narcan[®] does not require assembly.



- plunger to spray.
- * Do NOT push the plunger until the nozzle is in
 - the nostril. NO TEST SPRAY is needed. If still not breathing in 2-3 minutes, use the 2nd

WHAT NOT TO DO IN **OVERDOSE**

Do not DELAY calling 911

Do not put the person in a bath or in shower Do not give the person anything to drink Do not inject the person with anything Do not pour water over the face or slap too hard Do not leave the person till help arrives
